STUDENT SUPERVISION

To ensure that we have adequate supervision for our students on campus, **we ask each family to provide approximately 35–40 hours of student supervision over the course of the academic year.** The exact number of hours is dependent on how many hours of classes your child attends. While we cannot guarantee that your supervision will perfectly coincide with your child's class times, you are welcome to bring your children with you while you supervise. OUR PHILOSOPHY

Our classes incorporate the principles and philosophy discussed in *A Thomas Jefferson Education and Leadership Education: The Phases of Learning* by Oliver DeMille. Many are based on the programs created by the Leadership Education Mentoring Institute (LEMI), and all our mentors are LEMI trained. SPECIAL NOTE ON THE RISK OF OVER-SCHEDULING

Most of our classes include work to be done outside of class. Each year, some students take on more than they can reasonably manage, leading to stress that affects not only the student but also families and mentors. We prioritize quality of work over volume. Setting students up to succeed assists them in gaining and maintaining a love of learning. Over-scheduling undermines that goal.

We trust you know your child best. Please review the "Outside Work Required" section for each class and consider your child's full schedule, including studies at home, other classes, community college courses, and music or athletic commitments. Some of our higher-level Scholar classes carry a heavier workload. Time estimates are only guidelines. If your child reads slowly, finds writing challenging, or enjoys deep research, please plan for additional time.

Love of Learning Classes

CHILDREN OF LIBERTY: A LIVING LITERATURE EXPERIENCE (ages 8 to 12)

THURSDAY, 11:00PM–12:45PM

Give your child more than just reading—invite them into a world where stories come alive.

Children of Liberty is a literature-based course designed especially for families who want to cultivate a genuine love of reading while nurturing creativity, critical thinking, and emotional growth. Through carefully selected, timeless classics, students don't just read—they experience each story.

In this immersive course, children will step into the worlds of beloved classics like *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, *Charlotte's Web*, *Island of the Blue Dolphins*, and more. Through engaging, hands-on activities, they'll explore the sights, sounds, and even the flavors of each story—bringing literature off the page and into their hearts.

Students will be encouraged to:

- Discover deeper meanings and themes within each book
- Build emotional intelligence by understanding characters and relationships
- Express themselves through creative and artistic projects
- Make meaningful connections between the stories and their own lives

Each book culminates in a joyful, themed celebration—complete with activities, sensory experiences, and treats inspired by the story—giving students something to look forward to and making learning truly memorable.

Outside Work Required: Students will need approximately 1–2 hours per week for reading (independently or with a parent), light journaling or worksheet responses. Additional time throughout the year will be devoted to creative projects and simple presentations that reinforce learning in a meaningful way.

*An optional award will be offered to encourage additional educational effort.

WRITING (ages 8 to 12)

THURSDAY, 1:45PM–3:15PM

Writing is a crucial life skill and one that many homeschool children do not get enough opportunity to practice, or, if they do, it involves gnashing of teeth and tears. This class uses materials from Andrew Pudewa's Institute for Excellence in Writing and is excellent for both those who love to write and for reluctant writers. It includes the study of writing and vocabulary, and is open to new and returning students.

Students need to be able to read and be comfortable with the physical act of writing. They will need someone who can edit their papers (parent, friend, older sibling, etc.).

Outside Work Required: Students will need 1 to 3 hours each week to complete the homework. If you have a reluctant writer it is recommended to divide this up into more than one sitting.

READER'S THEATRE (ages 9 to 13)

THURSDAY, 3:30PM-4:45PM

Come join an environment for young people to practice vocal expression and public speaking as they read from classics, legends, fables, poetry, and radio theatre works. Students will learn expressive storytelling and voice-over concepts using scripts and stories as the format. The class will include theatrical and improvisation games/warm-ups, echo exercises, engaging activities, and breathing tips. Students work as a team as they use their unique voices to narrate stories, portray characters, and use imaginative sound effects. If available, we will invite special guests from the voice-over or audio story production industry to our class!

Skill development: literacy, use of story and script formats, highlighting/marking, cueing, pausing, tempo, phrasing, listening/silence, and timing. Focus will include imitation, pronunciation, tone, clarity, volume, and practice.

Outside Work Required: Students will need up to 30-minutes per week to read the weekly emails, and periodic preparations for class such as bringing in costume accessories, completing a worksheet, finishing a project or watching a related video. (Optional award work for interested students -TBD)

Scholar Classes

KEY OF LIBERTY (ages 12 to 18)

THURSDAY, 9:00AM-10:45AM

What is liberty? Who should be free? Where does freedom come from?

This class focuses on the founding era of American History, the Revolutionary War, the Declaration of Independence, and the U. S. Constitution. This will be an interactive and in-depth study of the principles that inspired ordinary people to create a new paradigm of government. Students will be challenged and supported in building critical scholar skills such as: increasing attention span, managing time and long-term projects competently, reading for both content and application, writing persuasively, and public speaking.

Students will read and discuss freedom classics, study and memorize core documents including the Declaration of Independence and the US Constitution, and participate in historical simulations.

Learn about 'life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness' in Key of Liberty!

* We hope to offer a merit-based Spring trip for students in this class to visit key historical sites on the East Coast.

Outside Work Required: Students will need 5 to 10 hours each week to complete reading and writing assignments, presentations, speeches, etc. Additional time will be needed for students attempting to earn award making them eligible for the trip.

PERSONAL FINANCE (ages 14 to 18)

(FALL ONLY: SEPTEMBER-DECEMBER)

In this class, students will learn real-life money skills using the Foundations in Personal Finance curriculum by Dave Ramsey. Through this curriculum, we'll explore how to budget, save, avoid debt, invest wisely, and make smart choices as consumers.

But this isn't just a lecture-based class—we'll bring money to life through interactive games, group discussions, and real-world scenarios. Students will also read selected books on investing and personal finance to deepen their understanding and think critically about how money works.

Is your learner interested in diving deep into his/her personality and learning more about how he/she ticks? Have you thought about how your student would handle a job or college application interview? Does your student know how and when to write a proper thank you note? Would your learner panic about which fork to use and what bread plate is his/hers? Does your student need support with gratitude, positive self-talk, and resilience?

This master class is a unique, semester-long training series where students learn how to handle and be prepared for many real life situations. Scholar Classes

THE VOICE, THE PEN, AND THE SWORD 1 (ages 14 to 18)

THURSDAY, 11:00AM-1:00PM

Reading for understanding, discussing to gain clarity, writing to refine thinking, debating to refine ideas, and speaking persuasively with confidence—these are the skills that set students apart. This course actively develops them through guided practice, meaningful feedback, and dynamic engagement.

Students cultivate a lifelong love of learning while growing as independent thinkers and emerging leaders. Through classic texts and rich discussion, they learn to ask thoughtful questions, challenge assumptions, and engage with the great ideas that shape our world. Writing becomes a powerful tool for both learning and influence, while regular speeches, debates, and simulations build poise and confidence in speaking.

At a time when many students enter college without strong communication or study skills, this course provides a clear advantage—equipping students with the reading, writing, thinking, and speaking abilities essential for success in college and beyond.

Writing instruction includes materials from the Institute for Excellence in Writing (IEW), helping students build both confidence and competence in high school–level writing.

Outside Work Required: Students will need 5 to 10 hours each week to complete reading and writing assignments, preparation for presentations, speeches, debates, etc.

SHAKESPEARE CONNECTIONS (ages 14 to 18)

In Shakespeare Connections, we explore the poetry, humor, wit, and wisdom of William Shakespeare through reading, writing, discussion, and performance. In the fall, we read and discuss several of Shakespeare's plays. Beginning in January, we are rehearsing and performing! Acting gives students an opportunity to understand Shakespeare's plays and characters at a deeper level, and "sets the stage" for developing many practical skills – public speaking, persuasiveness, as well as the use of language, humor, movement, and body language to tell a story. Actors learn to work with others and develop as a team, as well as technical aspects of Theatre.
